

# English as a resource for multicultural understandings


 English has already become a global language which is not only a means of disseminating new knowledge in any field throughout the world but also a means for intercultural communication.

Encourage children to WORK ON THE TOPICS that help them understand more about others who have a different background from their own



### Share Cultures Through Storytelling


- Storytelling is a lively way to capture a child's curiosity about others.

- Be careful in your story selection. Select stories that young children can relate to.
- Think about who the children are and what they can handle.
- Let the children tell their stories and be the leader some days, too.
- You can use stories as a springboard for discussions about a culture.


#### Coordinating a cultural celebration
